Talk to your teachers who have agreed to write your recommendations and give them updates as well as due dates.

Stay organized. Now is the time when teachers start to assign long-term papers and projects. If you have a paper or project due within a month or two, set up weekly reminders and a realistic timeline to keep you on track.

When colleges visit your school, or if they have regional meetings or open houses (look on your school's website or bulletin board or check with your counselor about dates, times, and locations), make every effort to attend these meetings. Go with friends or parents.

You will learn much from these college representatives, even if you have already visited their colleges. In many cases, these representatives will act as your advocate if you apply to their program. Ask strong questions and thank them for their time. Get their E-mail addresses so that when you have questions later, you can contact them.

Sign up for those Static tests. Dig out those Geometry, Algebra I & II books and notes. Review ten minutes each night until the tests. This will help you to remember your math, and it could help with your present math classes. Also, take practice tests and review your old tests for verbal, Math, and writing.
